Pruning and Growing

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President's Message

Happy Spring everyone!

I am writing this to you with the back doors of my kitchen open and enjoying the warmth of the sunny day. Yes, it appears that spring is in the air. Totem Talk's theme of "Pruning and Growing" is so appropriate with our current DKG BC activities. The "Name Change" proposal put forth by Donna-Faye Madhosingh under DKG BC, addresses the need for DKG to maintain and grow by

rebranding the DKG name. The proposed "Name Change" to **International Society of Women Educators**, is listed as #64 and #65 in the 3rd grouping of DKG Proposed Amendments to the Constitution and ISR. Unfortunately, the DKG Administrative Board has decided to recommend <u>non-adoption</u> of our proposed amendment citing an estimated \$65,000 administrative cost to International, in addition to other costs to Provinces/States and Chapters.

Fortunately, there is more than one side of what would help DKG. Let's do some math.

1) A history our membership (source 2023 DKG leadership training and DKG International):

1929 Birth of DKG Membership 11 1939 DKG Membership grows to over 10,000 1991 DKG Membership peaks ot over 168,000 2023 DKG Membership has drecreased to under 52,000 March 18, 2024 Membership has further decreased to 50,160.

DKG in the future???

From 1991 to March 2024 DKG membership has decreased by 117,840. So, in 33 years it has decreased by an average of 3571 members each year. If the current trend continues, and if our

membership continues to decrease at the same rate, and we don't do everything we can, then DKG will cease to exist in 14 years.

2) DKG International finances (source DKG website)

	Adopted Budget 2022-2023	Adopted Budget 2023-2024	Difference
Total revenue from Dues, Fees, other income	\$2.382.010	\$2.311.140	Decreased by \$73,870

This decrease is due to declining membership. This means that every year DKG has less money to spend on Conferences, Conventions, Training sessions and other educational opportunities including projects and scholarships.

3) Fiscal impact as stated by DKG Treasurer of proposed "Name Change" amendments #64 and #65 is approximately **\$65,000**. With our current membership of 50,160 this would amount to \$1.30 per member. Of course, this doesn't account for additional costs to states and chapters, but could it really be so much more? Even if it was \$5 per member, it would be less than a Starbucks Latte.

A name change to **International Society of Women Educators** won't completely solve the DKG Membership crisis, but rebranding could significantly help, and currently DKG membership needs all the help it can get.

CONGRATULATIONS SWEDEN—50 years DKG!

hotel with a superb view over part of Stockholm, including the island of Skeppsholmen. There were 40 of us present. We started by taking a group

photo on the right.

Lunch was a joyous affair, with a glass of champagne and a short welcome speech from me, as President of Sweden. I also thanked the Jubilee Committee and the Information and Marketing Committee who, in collaboration with Birgitta Johansson, produced a small book and also an informative flyer containing games/memorabilia.

We were fortunate that the Vice-President of Sweden, Karin Grundahl, acted as *toastmaster* at the luncheon. We began with recorded speeches from International President Debbie Le Blanc and





Marie-Antoinette de Wolf, European Regional Director which we played while showing their pictures on screen. The whole lunch was a long succession of moving, interesting, and funny speeches. Our association was also presented with gifts and souvenirs. We were honoured to have representatives from Norway, and their president brought us a rose from the president of Finland! I don't want to name some more than others, as that would be a bit unfair, but I must say that Marianne Skardeus's speech about our founder Dr Annie Webb Blanton was particularly appreciated.

The original title is *Im Weissen Rössl*, and the action takes place in Austria. The music was written by Ralph Benatzky, but the script and lyrics have been rewritten and adapted many times by many authors. Magnus Lindman produced a Swedish translation suitable for opera in Sweden.

In short, a memorable day, incredibly well orchestrated. We'll long remember Delta Kappa Gamma Sweden's 50th anniversary! I couldn't possibly mention all the people involved by name, so I apologize if anyone finds out.


Bursting the Bubble!

Thanks to Lennor, I received a copy of <u>GB News in Brief</u>, Spring 2024, the British DKG newsletter. Most often I read newsletters from the Northwest Region but occasionally, to my delight, someone forwards a newsletter from a different region. Along with a description of our European-Canadian Zoom event, I found the various chapter programs very interesting.


The "Fashion City Outing" (Museum of London Docklands) organized by a member of Alpha chapter, described how Jewish settlers influenced the fashions and styles not only of

Londoners but internationally, made me think of the fashion industry that was once buoyant in Vancouver. I googled to see what is happening to that industry today and to my surprise, Google cited 53 fashion industries in Vancouver including 8 names that are known internationally. It seems the fashion industry has continued to thrive in Vancouver.

Professor Dennis Tourish spoke on Cults to Gamma Chapter. I looked up his book "On the Edge: Political Cults Right and Left" which looks fascinating. It is available on Amazon both in print and in Kindle.

Other outings sounded equally as interesting as did a discussion about the working conditions for teachers. It seems that few countries are exempt from the increasing workload for teachers, increasing parental demands, and increasing diversity of students and their needs.

A White Rose in Memory of Loretta Greenough



Loretta was a member of Fraser Shores Chapter (Gamma Chapter), since

May 1, 1980, one of BC's longest serving members. Among other positions, Loretta was chapter president, state president (1995-97) and state treasurer (1997-2009). She was also treasurer for the northwest conference in 2007. Loretta hosted events, participated provincially and internationally and never

failed to support the work of Fraser Shores even though she moved to the interior shortly after retiring in 2002.

Loretta taught for 33 years in Coquitlam, most of those years as a teacher-librarian, thus it came as no surprise that on moving to Chase, she and her husband created "T&L Reflections—a little Museum" which she continued to expand and curate after her husband's death. She was honored for her work by the BC Historical Federation in 2010.



Her letter to Fraser Shores last fall describing the heroics of the people who saved the museum and her home from the inferno that destroyed much of the Shuswap area gave Fraser Shores Chapter the impetus to send her a cheque for \$200 to use as needed for helping her community rebuild. Hers was a life of success as described by Ralph Waldo Emerson: "To know even one life has breathed easier because you lived. This is to have succeeded." Loretta's life touched many people; many lives breathed easier because she lived. Loretta was an inspiration to us all.



In February we met in Orrie's home to enjoy snacks and fellowship and listen to our guest speaker, Rev. Martha Camerson, Deacon of St. Barnabas Anglican church in New

We began with sharing our thoughts and memories of Loretta. All agreed that she was kind, warm, cheerful and will be missed. (see White Rose in Memory of Loretta Greenough p.4)

Rev. Cameron spoke about the food programs offered at St. Barnabas. She explained that the role of a Deacon is to serve as a liaison between the minister of the Church, the congregation, and the community. Martha is a retired Surrey School district educator (teacher-librarian), who, in her retirement, took courses at the Theology College at UBC to

become the Deacon. The Food Bank Program is a partnership between St. Barnabas and Shiloh-Fifth Avenue United Church. Volunteers distribute the food bags to over 200 families each week. About five pallets of food are delivered every Wednesday morning and distributed from 1:00 – 2:30 in the afternoons. They receive these goods from the Greater Vancouver Food Bank, and through donations, supplement these goods with the purchase of pet food and sometimes other food items. No one is turned away.

Martha also gave us a handout, which included a calendar of where in New Westminster families can partake in meals.

South Vancouver Island Chapter

March 15, 2024

We gathered at **Darlene Kakoske**'s place with bright windows and ocean views for our March meeting. We were only six around the table, but what a great afternoon with an amazing presenter, **Grace Mathieson.**

Grace talked about Anti-Racism and it's complexities. She is presently writing a curriculum for Middle School teachers and students grade 7 to 10. The title of the curriculum is **Standing Up For Change: An Antiracism Resource**.

Grace has a writing partner in **Ann Marie Anie** who lives and works in Hamilton, Ontario. They will search for a publisher to publish independently of any school district.

Grace discussed her upbringing growing up white as not having equal opportunity as certain students could choose options to study such as Languages (Latin) and History. Grace did not have this option and expectations were low. Grace could become a Nurse Assistant but there was little or no encouragement to become a nurse or doctor.

Grace created her own agency by studying more and completing a Master's in Education Degree from Ontario Institute for Studies in Education. The area of focus was "Critical White Studies and Implications for Rethinking Schooling".

Key Points in the Presentation:

- Anti-Racism is immersed in theory.
- How we identify as individuals is not always visible.
- Intersectional theory is an important concept with anti-racist work.
- We all must raise awareness and it is a constant journey to reflect on our actions.
- Developing empathy is a key skill to teach in the classroom.

We enjoyed looking at a <u>huge selection</u> of reading material on anti-racism: ie. Color Me Different; The Kindest Red; Meet David Suzuki; Story of Lincoln Alexander (First Black Former Lieutenant Governor of Ontario); My Best Friend is White; The Kindest Red: A Story of Hijab and Friend; Non-Violent Communication... and more.



We analyzed the term "White Privilege" which led to a very broad discussion in the group and animated talk!

Grace's Presentation left us with the feeling of 'We WANT MORE 'in terms of discussing Anti-Racism and it's broad term and the meaning of "Intersectional theory".

We would love to have Grace again for further discussions on Anti-Racism.

After dessert of frozen yogurt with strawberries, **Heather** led us in wonderful chair stretches.

Then came a couple welcome interruptions. Lennor received a call from **Gitta Franke-Zoellmer**, the **State President of Germany DKG** followed by another call from **Marika Heimbach the chair of the European Forum** committee. We agreed to have a zoom meeting on June 1st as a step to learning more about each other's areas and lives.

As Lennor had been up at six AM on March 9th to listen



to the **British DKG Quiz**, she treated us to some of the questions and answers. Such fun, everyone got some points and did not have to say, "The dog ate my homework" or "we had a



supply teacher".

We finished the afternoon with our hostess, Darlene, playing Ravel's **Ondine** while we wrote, doodled or just relaxed. A *Carpe Diem* quote by Miguel Cervantes, "Believe there are no limits but the sky" and a Lindt chocolate concluded our meeting. The Tlama Donkey was passed around and we collected \$311 to help with Xochilt's legal fees in the ongoing dilemma of Mexico's judicial system. We thanked our hostess and said our goodbyes.

However, Susan and the team are not able to continue the early stimulation program Tihueliske for out of school children. Susan also requested that the funds collected be donated to the education fund for Tlamacazapa through **Atzin** rather than towards the legal fees for Xochilt.





extra heavy with all the books she would need for the trip.






Eventually, her passions for reading and creativity and her

Medicine Qatar from 2007–2014 and continues to work in the field of environmental science, terrestrial ecosystems and sustainable development in arid regions. For the last decade she has been working to understand the physiology and ecology of photosynthetic organisms. This includes plants and cyanobacterial complex biocrusts in deserts and the bioactive compounds they produce.
